## Policy Workshop on Migration and Transnationalism

Brussels, 23 May 2011

The objective of the workshop is to present research results to respond better to policy makers needs in the field of migration. Migration in fact should not only be seen as a one-way flow from Third Countries to Europe. Return migration, circulation and transnational practices are significant and must be understood in order to design better migration policy. The workshop will tackle policy implications of new forms of transnational life-styles, and the effects of migration across national boundaries.

The incorporation/exclusion of migrants in the German-Turkish transnational space will be introduced as an example of current challenges for migration and integration policies, whilst the experiences of Senegalese migrants and their families in Europe and after return will be explored. Data on the characteristics and behaviour of migrants from Sub-Saharan countries to Europe will also be presented.
